



## Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Chicago - Answer Key (Source)

**Instructions:** Read the website resource and complete the video guided practice.

- 1) Dr. King arrived at Marquette Park on **Chicago**'s Southwest Side to lead a march of about 700 people.
- 2) The civil-rights leader and his supporters were there to protest **housing** segregation.
- 3) **Thousands** of jeering, taunting whites had gathered.
- 4) As Dr. King marched, someone hurled a **stone** at Dr. King's head, which caused him to fall to one knee.
- 5) Aides and **bodyguards** surrounded him to protect him from the rocks, bottles and firecrackers that rained down on the demonstrators.
- 6) Dr. King was one of **30** people who were injured.
- 7) The disturbance resulted in 40 arrests.
- 8) Dr. King later said, "I have seen many demonstrations in the South, but I have never seen anything so hostile and so **hateful** as I've seen here today."
- 9) Dr. King brought his protest movement **north** in 1966 to take on black urban problems, especially segregation.
- 10) Dr. King rented an **apartment** on the West Side.
- 11) The protests were designed to **pressure** the city's white leaders into making solid commitments to open housing.
- 12) The marches led to the board agreeing to end its **opposition** to open-housing laws in exchange for an end to the demonstrations.
- 13) Before he left town, King said it was "a first step in a 1,000-mile journey."
